#### **GENERAL RULES**

1. Each item must have been made by a 4-H member who is enrolled in a 4-H project within the current year.

2. Exhibits should portray base requirements as outlined in specific 4-H projects.

3. Pre-registered & additional entries accepted Sunday only, 11:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.

4. All animals must accompany vet/client papers.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS JUNIOR LIVESTOCK MARKET PROJECT & SALE CLARION COUNTY FAIR

1. Judge's decision is final and not subject to question.

**2.** This project is open to boys and girls who are 8 years of age and not yet 19 on January 1 of the current year, and who are members of a Clarion County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. Members must attend 50% of their club meetings. Each member is allowed to sell in one county only.

**3.** Animals must be started on feed, identified and weighed or tapped no later than: Steers – November 30 of the current year, Swine – April 15 of the current year, Lambs – April 15 of the current year, Goats – November 1 of the previous year.

**4.** A member may show 2 animals. Only one of each exhibitor's may be sold through the sale (live animals). A second animal may be put through the Junior Carcass show.

**5.** The exception to rule "3" is when the exhibitor's carcass animal is champion or reserve champion of a species on the rail. These eight carcasses (beef, sheep, swine & goat) will be sold at the Live Animal Sale.

6. Champions & Reserve Champions in the Junior Livestock Show must sell in the sale.

**7.** Animals will be weighed on Sunday the opening day of the Fair, beginning at 2:00 p.m. with Lambs, Steers and Goats. Pigs will be weighed on Saturday evening only.

8. All animals must be on fairgrounds and penned up no later than 1:00 p.m.

**9.** Each exhibitor MUST designate which animal will be in the carcass show at weighin.

**10.** Carcass animals will be shown live on foot the day after weigh-in. Following the live on foot carcass show animals will be slaughtered and judged on the rail.

11. Members are responsible for the care and feeding of their animals up until the time they are removed from the grounds by the buyer and/or trucker. Each member will be required to assist with promotional and sale related activities as designated by the committee.

12 Rules and regulations may be added or amended as the need arises by the Clarion County Sale Committee consisting of 4-H leaders, Vo-Ag Teachers and Extension Representatives.

**13.** All exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their stalls before leaving the Fair or returning Sunday following the sale to do the cleaning.

14. 4-H Club or FFA Members must be present and have charge of their animals at the time of judging.

**15.** In case a Junior Livestock member cannot be present at time of judging, their animal may be shown for them by another designated county 4-H or FFA member. The extension and FFA representative must be notified prior to the show. They will not be eligible for grooming and showing classes.

16. All market animals must be castrated at the time of registration. (April 15 or November 30).

# 17. All junior members MUST have a signed copy of the Quality Animal Standards on file with the Co. Extension Office.

18. Junior members must wear clean long pants or dress/skirt below the knee. Collared shirt with sleeves, buttoned appropriately, or 4-H Club T-Shirt. No commercial logos other than 4-H or FFA. No bare midriffs. No hats. Appropriate shoes for showing, which should be hard sold shoes, especially for steers and hogs. No sandals.

19. All proper paperwork must be presented with entry.



# SECTION A-5 – SWINE **BUILDING & GROUNDS FEE \$3 PER HEAD**

#### SWINE HEALTH REGULATIONS

1. No swine showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to any show.

**2.** All 4-H & FFA Swine must be castrated & healed completely before the Fair.

**3.** All show swine must be individually identified by either ear tag, ear notch or tattoo. 4. Brucellosis and Pseudorabies:

(a) No testing is necessary at this point, but the Fair Board reserves the right to require a brucellosis test and pseudorables test if it appears in Pennsylvania prior to the Fair.

(b) All breeding swine over 6 months of age, must be negative to a brucellosis test conducted after April 1, to be eligible for the entire show season unless they originate from a brucellosis validated swine herd.

(c) All breeding swine over 6 months of age for sale following exhibition must be negative to a brucellosis test and pseudorables testconducted within 30 days of sale date unless they originate from a brucellosis validated and pseudorabies validate herd. Validated certificate number and date of test must be shown on the CVI (AAI-13) prepared by the veterinarian.

5. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2013 is required.

6. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form.

7. Individual animal ID is required. ID options include the following:

•A form of official ID (herd tattoo in comination with an ear notch; or a state issued metal ear tag; or an ISO-compliant Radio Frequency Identification tag); or

•A plastic stamped ear tag.

•4-H/FFA Projects must have an official county tattoo.
