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#### **ATTENTION EXHIBITORS**

PLEASE NOTE: Many changes have been made this year. Please read your Premium Book very carefully. Note changes in the following section, general rules and most departments.

### TO: All Exhibitors RE: 2012 Clarion County Fair July 21 thru July 27

**NOTICE:** During the Fair Week, 2013, we will be revising the gate policy and camper locations. To improve the flow of traffic and control the number of vehicles on the grounds, we have established the following:

**1.** All traffic will enter through the parking field road. The traffic will proceed through the field road leading to the farm gate.

**2.** Only cars with passes will be allowed in this area, and you must affix the pass to your mirror. This will allow the parking attendant to direct you to the farm gate.

**3.** Wrist bands must be shown to the gate personnel for all people in the vehicle. The car pass allows the vehicle only.

**4.** Absolutely no vehicles will be permitted on grounds from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. This will be strictly enforced.

**5.** Vehicle parking area will be established. Please note the area around the barns and the blue building, and the center area around the grandstand and the old merry-goround building, have been declared fire zones.

**6.** All persons staying on Fairgrounds must stay at campsite. No sleeping in barns. All youth under age 20, staying all night, must furnish one chaperone who will also spend the night. Chaperone must be at least 21 years of age. Chaperone must be registered with the Fair office and provide a roster of those they are responsible for.

7. Fairgrounds close at 12:00 midnight.

8. Youth violators of above Fair rules will be released to parents on first violation.

Second violation, youth will be barred from Fair competition. Adult violators will be escorted to the gate.

9. Livestock department superintendents may designate an adult supervisor to maintain security in barn areas.

#### **RULES & REGULATIONS**

- 1. Camping reservations will be accepted starting the last Monday of June each year.
- 2. All persons camping on the fairgrounds (RV & tents) must complete a registration form.
- 3. Farm exhibitors - \$25 per camping unit, includes (1) electric hook-up. No air conditioners permitted!

4. Tent sites – \$25 per tent, includes room to set the tent with no hook-ups. Tents placed at RV sites are also \$25. L

5. Water & Electric sites - \$65 per unit, includes (1) water & electric hook-up campsite. A/C permitted. Sites limited.

6. Full Hook-up – \$120 per unit, includes (1) water, electric and sewage hook-up campsite. A/C permitted. Sites limited.

7. Campers are to use park dumpsters during scheduled hours (times will be posted on the dumpsters). All campers are to dispose of their garbage during these hours. Those placing garbage on or around the dumpsters outside of the scheduled times will be subject to penalty.

8. Complete campground rules are posted at the park office. All campers are advised to be familiar

with these rules.

# **GENERAL RULES**

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Clarion County Fair.

2. The Fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.

3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.

4. Entries will be made according to classification. Entries may be changed to proper categories at superintendent's discretion. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.

5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette.

6. The Fair reserves the right to determine how many entries it will accept from an exhibitor in the same class or, in the case of livestock, the same breed.

7. THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. In such cases, the superintendent, manager, or secretary of the Fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Fair management from whose decision there can be no appeal.

# 8. All entries must be grown, produced, or made in the area since the last Fair.

**9.** Superintendents of departments reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.

**10.** The Fair management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of the exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food.

**11.** No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the Fair except by consent of the management.

**12.** Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the Fair or show which shall be supplied by the Fair free of charge.

13. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except Fair officials, judges, Pennsylvania Fair Fund officials, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor nor his agent shall communicate with the judges during time of determining the awards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premiums to which he would otherwise be entitled.

14. No exhibitor may enter more than one article in each subdivision of each class in the Home Economics Division (Depts. 13, 15, 17 and 18) as well as in the Youth Under 19 Division (Dept. 11). Any article exhibited in 4-H, FFA or FHA divisions is **NOT** eligible for competition also in Dept. 11, and therefore may only be registered in one or the other department – not both – regardless of the dates of judging for either. This is in agreement with the purpose of Dept. 11, according to state rules.

15. Entries in Dept. 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 15, 17, 18, 19 and 20 will be accepted from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., SUNDAY ONLY. No Monday entries will be accepted. Judging in these departments will be on Monday. Building will be closed until judging is finished and displays are completed.

**16.** A Baked Goods Auction will be held with items from Depts. 10, 11 and 15 on Monday at approximately 6:00 p.m.

17. All entries must stay until 8:00 p.m., Saturday evening or premium will be forfeited. Entries may be picked up Saturday evening from 8:00 to 10:30 p.m. Exhibitors must be able to prove ownership of exhibits before claiming articles.

18. Entry fees have been eliminated in Depts. 11, 12, 13, 15, 17, 18, 19 and 20.

**19.** While it is the full intention and desire to pay all premiums in full, as advertised in this premium catalog, yet should any contingency arise by reason of unfavorable weather, etc., whereby the receipts of the Association are short and/or the state reimbursement has been reduced or withdrawn, then in that event the Board reserves the right to pay pro-rata upon the gross receipts after deducting the expenses, and the amounts so paid shall discharge the obligations of the Association of the current year.

**20.** PASSES (Wristbands) – Open Exhibitors \$10.00 with animal entry fee of \$4.00 or more, limit to maximum of two, immediate family only. Exhibitor and camper passes do not permit admission to stage, field shows or rides. **Wristbands must be worn at all times.** 

21. Premiums will be paid when State Fair reimbursement funds are received.

**22.** Entries accepted in the following order – 4-H and Clarion County first, previous exhibitors second, others by date of entry, if space available.

23. No pets permitted on fairgrounds -- service animals only.

24. Thursday night prior to Fair Week is work night on the grounds.

**25.** General admission, \$8.00 per person, includes parking, rides and grandstand seating on a first-come, first-serve basis. Children 2 & under admitted free, unless child will be riding rides. No refunds. **Sunday only – \$2.00 per vehicle.** 

26. A Building & Grounds Fee of \$3.00 per head and .50¢ per rabbit has been added to entry entry fees.

# NOTICE

All persons who enter the grounds and use the facilities on said grounds for the purpose of exhibiting, displaying, competing, seeing the exhibits, being entertained by the attractions at the Fair, or in any other manner participating in the Fair, do so at their own risk.

The Clarion County Fair Association will not intentionally show or permit to be shown any dangerous attractions on the grounds. However, the showing of certain attractions required that spectators be reasonably watchful of conduct of their children, and although the Fair Association will take every precaution, it will not be responsible for any personal injury or property damage suffered by reason of any attraction shown or exhibited during the Fair.

Any person entering the grounds in a state of intoxication or with intoxicating liquor, drugs or illegal substances in his/her possession, or with concealed weapons on his/her person, forfeits all rights to the Fairgrounds. Pool selling, betting or immoral conduct of any kind will positively not be permitted on the grounds.

## **RULES FOR LIVESTOCK** Livestock Committee – PAUL BROWN, TIM BROWN, BILL SNYDER, KEITH MILLER, CINDY SEIGWORTH, STEVE REICHARD, TRAVIS SMITH, SCOTT SHIREY, GARRETT RANKIN, LAURA HEASLEY, PATTY ANDERSON and JOHN FERRINGER

1. Clarion County Fair discourages the use of drugs, biologics or any chemical from fitting products in the raising of all Junior Livestock Animals being shown at our fair. If it is found upon slaughter that the meat was in violation of the "Federal Meat Inspection Act", the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

**2.** All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owners thirty (30) days or longer. (Livestock entered under a name other than the owner's shall be disqualified for premiums.)

**3.** The market animal should be weighed on the same set of scales, under a qualified weighmaster at the discretion of the Fair.

**4.** Should any animals awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.

**5.** Overfitting of all livestock will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.

**6.** When accepted for exhibition, each animal must be shown in halter and controlled by the owner or employee. The Fair will have standby attendants available during the youth judging or showing, men designated if there is trouble with the animals.

7. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.

**8.** The IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics shall govern care, showmanship, and conduct for all livestock shows during the Clarion County Fair (See Appendix A).

**9.** All livestock will be released at 9:30 p.m., Saturday night only. No loading prior to that time and it must be done in an orderly fashion. All livestock must exit using top road around the back side of the skating rink.

10. Limited sawdust will be supplied by the Fair Association. Each exhibitor will supply his own grain, hay and bedding.

**11.** Any animal which cannot be satisfactorily handled under show conditions will be removed from Fairgrounds in accordance with livestock committee decision.

12. ALL ANIMALS entered in the breeding classes must be recorded or accepted for registry in the recognized books for their respective breeds. Exhibitors must have registration and transfer certificates available for inspection by management at any time until the judging of the breed is completed. Only original breed registration papers will be accepted when checking entries. No photostats or other copies will be accepted.

13. No animals permitted on grounds before 8:00 p.m., Saturday prior to Fair. No security until Sunday. *All animal entries* must use the farm gate and must be accepted (visually checked) for entry by the Fair management prior to unloading. Check-in times will be from 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., Saturday evening, from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Sunday. The ONLY exception to this rule is if prior arrangements have been made with livestock superintendent. *Health papers* must be presented to the barn representative at the barn.

14. Exhibitors are responsible for informing themselves as to when their stock will be shown. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competition.

**15.** Each exhibitor must submit a \$30 check separate from entry fee per exhibitor, per species. Check will be returned when signed out by barn supervisor. **No animal will be acceted without pre-payment**.

16. All livestock owners MUST clean stalls or specified animal areas by the times posted at each barn and must check out with barn supervisor before leaving or \$30 fee will not be returned.

17. Everyone is responsible for their own clean-up of stalls. Any clean-up remaining after Saturday night to start at 7:30 a.m. Sunday.

18. Concerns should follow this chain of command:

- 1. Department Chair
- 2. Livestock Committee\*
- 3. Executive Board of the Fair Assoc. Decisions by the body are considered final.

\*If this concern involves youth, an appointed representative from Cooperative

Extension or FFA will be involved in the decision.

19. Entries close June 28.

**20.** If an animal bites a person and draws blood, the animal must be removed from Fair and quarantined for ten (10) days.

### HEALTH RULES FOR LIVESTOCK

**1. Grooming Products and Their Use** – Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are uncertain that a product is residue-safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it.

IMPORTANT – If upon slaughter, treatment drugs, biologics, or any chemical from fitting products is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

#### **GENERAL HEALTH CERTIFICATION**

1. The base date for computing health rules will be the opening day of the show.

**2.** Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes.

**3.** All animals (cattle, sheep, goats, horses and swine) admitted to the Clarion County Fair must be accompanied by an official BAHDS indicating compliance with applicable state and federal regulations. A statement by an accredited veterinarian that these animals were **EXAMINED AFTER MAY 1, 2013,** and found to be free of clinical signs of contagious disease shall also accompany these animals.

**4.** All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after returning to the herd of origin.

**5.** CVIs (AAI-13) may be obtained from the Regional Office of the PA Dept. of Agriculture, 13410 Dunham Rd., Meadville, PA 16335, 814-332-6890.

6. CVIs must be presented before animals are unloaded at the Fair.

**7.** An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form.

8. Veterinarian should be consulted if the health of an animal is in question.

**9.** The Clarion County Fair follows the National Code of Show Ring Ethics. See Appendix A.

#### IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS & EXPOSITIONS) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times present themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following are guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

**1.** All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

**2.** Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animals health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

**3.** Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state the and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other samples taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservations, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

**5.** Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counter-irritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

**6.** The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance or other similar practices are not acceptable

and are prohibited.

**7.** Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, or other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

**8.** No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

**9.** The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fair and Expositions and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state or provincial statues, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

#### **HEALTH RULES FOR HORSES**

1. No Equine showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to any show or other fair event.

**2.** Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) – All horses must be official ELISA or AGID (Coggins) test negative within one year of admission to the show. The negative test report must accompany the horse. The negative test must have been conducted within 12 months of the opening date of the show.

**3.** All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). Foals less than 6 months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

**4.** Horses and other equidae assembled for exhibition, competition, or sale should be immunized to prevent contagious respiratory disease not less than 15 days before the show. Exhibitors are advised to consult their veterinarian regarding proper conditioning and vaccination of their animals at least 30 days prior to the event.

5. Animals will be appointed housing according to chairman.

6. Veterinarian should be consulted if the health of a horse is in question.

**7.** Solid color animals must be identified by some method of unique identification such as a lip tattoo, brand or at least two (2) distinct markings.

**8.** PA 4-H Horse and Pony rules require that all horses and ponies entered in 4-H horse shows must be vaccinated against rabies at least one month, but not more than 12 months, before the opening date of the show (revaccination is required each year). Exhibitors can present a statement signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animal was vaccinated. Proof of vaccination may appear on the CVI.

**9.** A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

**10.** An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form.

## **RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR HORSES**

1. No open horse entry shall be entitled to a premium unless stabled at the Fair.

2. Horses entered as matched pairs must be owned by one person or firm.

**3.** Animals or combination of animals owned by one exhibitor may be entered in the classes noted in premium book.

4. All animals must compete and be shown.

**5.** In no case is it permissible to show mixed breeds in the same class or division to be judged against each other for premiums.

6. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.

7. Rules apply to all horses and ponies.

8. Make entries early. When housing is exhausted, entries will be refused.

**9.** Registration papers must be presented to barn representative before horses are unloaded.

**10.** In the absence of competition, right is reserved to award premiums of grade which the exhibit merits. Grand Champion awards will be given only where there is competition.

11. Animals must have been entered in individual classes to be eligible to show in group classes.

12. Horses within the grounds will not be ridden except in designated areas. Horses must be led to riding area.

1. Entries close June 28, or earlier if stalls are full. Entries must be made before stalls can be reserved. Horses must be stalled at the Fair to compete. All stall reservations must be made to Clarion County Fair Office by June 28. Horses must be in place by 7:00 p.m. Sunday and stay until release time Saturday.

**2.** No stallion will be accepted for entry.

**3.** All riders in classes, except pee-wee, must be able to control their horse, independently, while inside the ring. Assistance entering and exiting the ring is permitted. Any pony or horse which cannot be handled satisfactorily under show conditions and is presenting a danger to its rider, ring crew and/or spectators will be dismissed from the show. This will be at the discretion of the horse show judge and/or Fair officials. In addition, exhibitors and owners are advised that any improper treatment of their animals (as

specified in the 4-H rule book and in the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics) will result in disqualification from the show and a forfeiture of entry fees paid.

**4.** Horses are to be led to and from the barn to the ring by using the upper road (above campers). At no time are horses to be ridden in the park or through the campers.

5. For all classes: Ponies are 14.2 hands or below; Horses are over 14.2 hands.

**6.** Each exhibitor must clean up his/her own stall(s) after removing animal(s) on Saturday evening. Those who do not clean their stalls will have the cost of clean-up deducted from their premiums.

## DAIRY & BEEF CATTLE HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

All animals must have an official ear tag, official legible breed registration tattoo, or RFID.

#### **Requirements:**

1. No cattle showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease, including active ring worm, warts, lice and mange, will be admitted to any show.

**2.** Official CVI (AAI-13) issued by the Bureau of Animal Industry must accompany all cattle for show and sale. No Tuberculosis or Brucellosis test is required for Pennsylvania Cattle.

**3.** Interstate animals exhibited at Pennsylvania shows or fairs must meet the Pennsylvania requirements and must be accompanied by an interstate health certificate to be eligible for entry. A Tuberculosis test is required. Animals originating from Class A, B or C states must call 717-783-9550 for current requirements for Brucellosis test requirements.

4. Shipping Fever complex is not permitted for animals consigned to slaughter.

**5.** An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form.

**6.** A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information

must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

1. ## SECTION 1 – BREEDING SHEEP HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

1. A statement by an accredited veterinarian that these animals were **EXAMINED AFTER MAY 1, 2013,** and found to be free of clinical signs of contagious disease shall also accompany these animals. No sheep showing clinical signs of contagious, infectious or external parasitic disease including foot rot, sore mouth & external parasites will be admitted to any show.

**2.** All show sheep must be individually identified by an ear tag or tattoo and this identification must be listed on the CVI.

**3.** The flock of origin, including sheep consigned to a show, shall be examined by an accredited veterinarian. The veterinarian must prepare the CVI (AAI-13) and must state on the CVI that he examined the entire flock and found no evidence of contagious, infectious or external parasitic disease. The date of exam must also appear on the CVI. All sheep from other states must be accompanied by an interstate CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian indicating examination for health within 60 days.

**4.** Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:

•A scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Your order may take several weeks for processing so order tags early; or

•A scrapie tattoo with individual animal ID (tattoo); or

•An ISO-compliant RFID tag.

**5.** Dipping not required of sheep entries from officially recognized scabies free areas; all other sheep must be dipped in an officially permitted solution within 10 days of the opening date of the show.

**6.** Shipping fever complex is recommended that all sheep, except those consigned for immediate slaughter, to be properly immunized before shipment to exhibition.

7. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination

requirement). All vaccine lable directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated sheep must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination informatin must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

8. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form. RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Any animal of unthrifty nature, unsuitable condition, or which cannot be satisfactorily handled under show condition must be removed from the fair grounds.

2. Pen of lambs consists of 2 ram lambs and 2 ewe lambs.

3. Flock consists of 1 ram, any age; 2 ewes, 1 yr. & under 2 yr.; 2 ewes under 1 yr.

4. Breeder's young flock consists of ram lamb & 2 ewe lambs, all bred & owned by exhibitor.

5. A Get of Sire shall consist of four breeding animals, any age or sex, the get on one sire. Get need not be owned by the exhibitor.

- 6. Champion Ribbons will be given only when there is more than one exhibitor.
- 7. Entry Fee \$5.50 Per Animal.
- 8. Only one group class per exhibitor.
- 9. Lambs shown in breeding classes cannot be shown in market classes or vice versa.



#### GOAT HEALTH REGULATIONS

1. ALL Goats must have an official eartag or legible breed registration tattoo.

2. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:

•A scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain srapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Your order may take several weeks for processing, so order tags early; or

•An ISO-compliant RFID tag; or

•A scrapie tattoo. Goats with an official scrapie tattoo must also have a unique individual animal ID (tattoo) to meet the scrapie ID requirement; or

•Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

**3.** No goat showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease including caseous lymphadenitis, sore mouth, active earring worm, foot rot, warts, lice and mange will be admitted to the show.

4. A statement by an accredited veterinarian that these animals were **EXAMINED AFTER MAY 1, 2013** and found to be free of clinical signs of contagious disease shall also accompany these animals.

5. No horns except on Angora, Pygmy and Boer.

**6.** An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form.

7. Tuberculosis testing requirements:

•No test is required for animals originating from "Accredited Free" states or zones.

•All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" must be tested negative within 60 days prior to importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).

•All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have been tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

### HEALTH REGULATIONS

1. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form.

2. 4-H exhibitors must also present an "ethics" form (given by their leaders) at the time of arrival.

3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the grounds.

4. After an animal passes its health examination, then the management will temporarily tag the animal's ear and assign the animal to a cage.

5. Animals do not need permanent tattoos.

6. Any rabbit showing signs of disease or poor health during Fair Week will be placed in a quarantined area & must be removed immediately by exhibitor. These health rules will be strictly enforced.

#### GENERAL RULES

1. Only registered animals will be allowed in the barn. If no registration tags are produced at time of the animal's arrival, the animal will not be admitted until these are produced.

2. The management will use diligence to ensure the safety of all rabbits after their arrival and placement, but in no case are they responsible for loss or damage.

3. Cages could be re-assigned, if space restrictions require them to be, on the day of arrival - all owners/showers will be notified if this occurs to their animal.

4. All rabbits must be at least 8 wks. old at the time of the show to be entered for competition

5. Owners should anticipate having to provide feed for their own animals, but some will be provided by management at the Fair if feed is not available.

6. A reminder of general fair rules regarding passes: In order to purchase a \$10.00 wristband, exhibitor must have a rabbit entry fee of at least \$4.00 or more. Wristbands limited to two, immediate family only.

7. For every rabbit that an owner sells during the fair week, the management will collect

a \$1 fee to go towards the further care and upkeep of our department.

8. Entry fee - \$1.25 per open class entry.

#### MEAT RABBIT RULES

1. A Meat Pen consists of 3 rabbits of the same breed and variety (color).

2. All animals in a meat pen must be under 10 wks. old (or 70 days) at the time of the show.

3. Each animal in the meat pen must not weigh over 5 pounds.

4. If one animal in the meat pen is disqualified or eliminated for being overweight (or for any other reason), the whole pen will be eliminated.

5. 4-H meat pens must be the 4-H-er's rabbit project for the current year.

6. Top four placing meat pens will be sold at auction on the Friday of fair week.

#### PET RABBIT RULES

1. Only one pet entry per exhibitor will be accepted.

2. An animal may only be shown in the pet class if not being shown in any other category.

3. A pet rabbit is a small mixed breed rabbit, the characteristics of which the exhibitor finds appealing.

## RABBIT SHOWMANSHIP

1. Only 4-H members may show in the showmanship category.

2. The animal entered must be the 4-H project of, and owned by, the exhibitor.

3. The exhibitor must be present to compete in the showmanship category.

4. Judging will be Monday, starting at 4:30 p.m. Participants must sign up for a specific time slot at check-in on Sunday

#### **GENERAL RULES**

1. Each item must have been made by a 4-H member who is enrolled in a 4-H project within the current year.

2. Exhibits should portray base requirements as outlined in specific 4-H projects.

3. Pre-registered & additional entries accepted Sunday only, 11:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.

4. All animals must accompany vet/client papers.

5. Wristbands – 4-H Exhibitors \$5.00 with project entry, limit to maximum of eight per family, immediate family only. 4-H wristbands do not permit admission to stage, field shows or rides. **Wristbands must be worn at all times.** Car Passes – \$5.00.

#### **GOOD HOUSEKEEPING**

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS JUNIOR LIVESTOCK MARKET PROJECT & SALE CLARION COUNTY FAIR

1. Judge's decision is final and not subject to question.

**2.** This project is open to boys and girls who are 8 years of age and not yet 19 on January 1 of the current year, and who are members of a Clarion County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter. Members must attend 50% of their club meetings. Each member is allowed to sell in one county only.

**3.** Animals must be started on feed, identified and weighed or tapped no later than: Steers – November 30 of the current year, Swine – April 15 of the current year, Lambs – April 15 of the current year, Goats – November 1 of the previous year.

**4.** A member may show 2 animals. Only one of each exhibitor's may be sold through the sale (live animals). A second animal may be put through the Junior Carcass show.

**5.** The exception to rule "3" is when the exhibitor's carcass animal is champion or reserve champion of a species on the rail. These eight carcasses (beef, sheep, swine & goat) will be sold at the Live Animal Sale.

6. Champions & Reserve Champions in the Junior Livestock Show must sell in the sale.

**7.** Animals will be weighed on Sunday the opening day of the Fair, beginning at 2:00 p.m. with Lambs, Steers and Goats. Pigs will be weighed on Saturday evening only.

8. All animals must be on fairgrounds and penned up no later than 1:00 p.m.

**9.** Each exhibitor MUST designate which animal will be in the carcass show at weighin.

**10.** Carcass animals will be shown live on foot the day after weigh-in. Following the live on foot carcass show animals will be slaughtered and judged on the rail.

11. Members are responsible for the care and feeding of their animals up until the time they are removed from the grounds by the buyer and/or trucker. Each member will be required to assist with promotional and sale related activities as designated by the committee.

12 Rules and regulations may be added or amended as the need arises by the Clarion County Sale Committee consisting of 4-H leaders, Vo-Ag Teachers and Extension Representatives.

**13.** All exhibitors are responsible for cleaning their stalls before leaving the Fair or returning Sunday following the sale to do the cleaning.

14. 4-H Club or FFA Members must be present and have charge of their animals at the time of judging.

**15.** In case a Junior Livestock member cannot be present at time of judging, their animal may be shown for them by another designated county 4-H or FFA member. The extension and FFA representative must be notified prior to the show. They will not be eligible for grooming and showing classes.

16. All market animals must be castrated at the time of registration. (April 15 or November 30).

# 17. All junior members MUST have a signed copy of the Quality Animal Standards on file with the Co. Extension Office.

18. Junior members must wear clean long pants or dress/skirt below the knee. Collared shirt with sleeves, buttoned appropriately, or 4-H Club T-Shirt. No commercial logos other than 4-H or FFA. No bare midriffs. No hats. Appropriate shoes for showing, which should be hard sold shoes, especially for steers and hogs. No sandals.

19. All proper paperwork must be presented with entry.



#### SWINE HEALTH REGULATIONS

1. No swine showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to any show.

**2.** All 4-H & FFA Swine must be castrated & healed completely before the Fair.

**3.** All show swine must be individually identified by either ear tag, ear notch or tattoo. 4. Brucellosis and Pseudorabies:

(a) No testing is necessary at this point, but the Fair Board reserves the right to require a brucellosis test and pseudorables test if it appears in Pennsylvania prior to the Fair.

(b) All breeding swine over 6 months of age, must be negative to a brucellosis test conducted after April 1, to be eligible for the entire show season unless they originate from a brucellosis validated swine herd.

(c) All breeding swine over 6 months of age for sale following exhibition must be negative to a brucellosis test and pseudorables testconducted within 30 days of sale date unless they originate from a brucellosis validated and pseudorabies validate herd. Validated certificate number and date of test must be shown on the CVI (AAI-13) prepared by the veterinarian.

5. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2013 is required.

6. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement must be signed on entry form.

7. Individual animal ID is required. ID options include the following:

•A form of official ID (herd tattoo in comination with an ear notch; or a state issued metal ear tag; or an ISO-compliant Radio Frequency Identification tag); or

•A plastic stamped ear tag.

•4-H/FFA Projects must have an official county tattoo.

To facilitate this process, the Show Committee will have the discretion to determine which class an animal will be shown (this may mean that animals of the same weight may be split between two classes). Purebred classes will be broken into two weight classes if 12-16 pigs are shown per breed. If more than 18 pigs are shown in a breed, the breed will be broken into three classes. In order to compete in purebred classes, market swine must be registered as recognized by their respective breed association. This includes appropriate permanent identification. At least 4 purebred market swine of one breed must be shown for that breed to be shown separately. If only three or fewer animals of one breed are eligible, they will be shown in the "Other Purebreds" class. Any purebred animal whose breed is not listed below must be entered into Other Purebreds.



### **General Rules**

1. Violation of any rule shall constitute a disqualification.

2. Contest to be governed by judge or judges with all decisions final.

3. Judges have the right to stop and disqualify any tractor if it is not being operated in such a manner as would be considered safe.

4. Tractors will be weighed at registration. If deemed necessary by the judges, any tractor may be reweighed at any time.

5. Pit Pass Fee - \$15.00 if paid at time of initial registration. Must be present to sign waiver at this time. Driver and helper free.

6. No minors under 16 allowed in pit unless an operator. Proof of age is required.

# FARM STOCK TRACTOR RULES

1. No consumption of alcoholic beverages or narcotics in track or pit area. Failure to observe rules will result in removal from track or pit area with no refund of entry fee; also will be barred from pulling with this organization for one full year.

2. All contestants must be 12 years of age with written parental consent through age 18. All drivers must wear shoes that completely cover the foot (no sandals), shirt, long pants before they are permitted to compete.

3. Judges have the right to re-weigh or re-tech any tractor anytime during or after the pull.

4. All engine fans must be shrouded with factory shroud or min. of 1/16" thick steel.

5. No weight may extend more than 24" beyond the most forward point of the tractor.

6. The tractor tires must remain in the boundaries of the contest course.

7. Min. draw bar length of 18" from the center of the rear axle to the point of hook. Draw bar must be stationary in all directions. Max. height of 20" from top of hitching device parallel to the ground. Clevis to be measured to the center.

8. Draw bar to be equipped with steel hitching device not more than 1.5" thick & a 31/2" diameter opening. Cross sectional thickness must be measured 7/8" min. to 1.5" max. Pulling point must not be more than 1.5" from back edge of the pulling device.

9. No pressurized tanks unless UL approved. No nitrous oxide, oxygen or propane.

10. No water injection.

11. All tractors must compete using the fuel that was intended by the factory.

- 12. All tractors competing must run under a working governor.
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**13.** No portion of the tractor may interfere with any portion of the sled or the sled hitching device during the pull. This includes weights.

**14.** All weights must be secured to the tractor (no tarp straps). No weights permitted on the seat or deck, inc. cab tractors. Any ballast or external parts lost while hooked to the sled will be cause for disqualification of that class, excluding internal parts.

**15.** All tractors must be equipped with workable rear brakes. Use of torque converters, power shifts, etc. is permitted.

**16.** Contestant has 100' to the front of the tractor to decide on change of gear, one restart per class. No restart permitted in a pull off.

**17.** Driver must be in total control of the tractor at all times while pulling and operate in a safe manner or be disqualified at the discretion of the flag person.

**18.** Tractor must be stopped upon signal from either track official. Pull is considered over when forward motion of the sled stops, no hole digging allowed.

**19.** All tractors must be in neutral or park transmission selector while being hooked and unhooked.

**20.** The number one puller will be the test puller, and may take the pull if the working condition of the weight machine is satisfactory. Driver will have the option to take the pull or drop to the sixth pulling position. All decisions on re-pulls must be made before the tractor leaves the track. In the event the weight transfer is changed there is no option to drop.

**21.** Each contestant may spot the sled for their pull. Contestant must notify track official or sled operator before the sled is backed into start position.

#### 22. All contestants must pull in position drawn within 3 minutes of sled spotting or will be disqualified. Track officials must be notified of any delays, and then the contestant may become last puller.

23. All pulls must start with a tight hitch, no jerking.

24. Disqualification for any reason will result in no prize monies for that class.

**25.** Registration closes at the start of the first class, unless due to traffic conditions. Judges' decision to be final.

**26.** No bracing above center of the rear axle unless cradled, except complete factory setup.

27. Farm stock classes are, but not limited to: 7500#, 9500#, 11,500# and 13,500#.

28. All classes must have hood grill and fenders.

**29.** There will be a 3000-rpm limit on all classes. Flagman has authority to stop & check.

**30.** Tire size limited to 20.8" wide and 42" high max.

**31.** Contest open to two-wheel-drive farm stock tractors with rubber tires. NO SHARP-ENED TIRES, no dual tires, no studs or chains permitted. Four-wheel-drive tractors are permitted if front wheels are disengaged.

**32.** Tractor motor and chassis must conform with one another, including carburetor and injection system.

33. No tractor may pull more than once in any class.

**34.** Failure to obey either flag person will result in disqualification of that class.

**35.** Any fighting will result in removal from grounds without refund of any entry fees and prize monies.

**36.** Tractors are required to have a working PTO.

**37.** Add-on turbo is permitted, no bigger than a 3LM housing with a 3" inlet max. and 3" outlet. Other turbos must be factory equipped size & specs. Limit of one turbo.

# HOT FARM TRACTOR RULES

1. Any tractor that has competed with the USA-EAST Limited Pro or Super Farm division in 2012 must submit to a complete 'super tech' prior to participating with the Hot Farms. Additionally any tractor competing more than twice (2) in the Limited Pro Stock/ Super Farm will not be eligible in the "Hot" Farm tractor during that pulling season.

**2.** All 'Hot Farm' tractors must be stock appearing. All hoods, grills, fenders and frame must be stock appearing for make and model being pulled. Tractor must have a sotck block or its factory replacement. Diesel is the only acceptable fuel.

3. A wide front-end is required for all competition tractors.

4. No pressurized fuel tanks are permitted in this class.

**5.** Water for cooling purposes of the turbo will be permitted. No types of accelerants or oxygen extenders or the like will be permitted.

**6.** Tractors must be equipped with steel hitching devices not more than 1.5" thick with a 3.5" diameter opening. Cross sectional thickness must be measured 1" min. to 1.5" max. Pulling point must not be more than 1.5" from back edge of the pulling device.

**7.** Tractors must hitch to a stationary draw bar with a max. 20" height and a minimum of 18" from the center of rear axle to the hitch point, a clevis is not permitted.

**8.** Any loss of weights or excess fluids or any part of the tractor during the pull will result in a disqualification. Tarp straps are not allwed anywhere on the tractor.

**9.** OEM stock intake and exhaust manifolds must be used for that series engine (alterations for turbo mounting ONLY are allowed).

10. Maximum Pump Size – 'P Pump'.

11. A single turbo-charger ONLY is permitted. There is no size restriction on the turbo-charger.

12. 20.8" tires the *largest* allowed with cut tires permitted.

13. All tractors must have wheelie bars that are able to support the weight of the tractor.

14. Front weights may not extend more than 13' from center of rear axle to the front of weights. Rear weights may not extend more than 6" past rear tires and may not interfere with hooking device or ability to hook and unhook the tractor from the sled.

**15.** SAFETY EQUIPMENT (NOTE: A true farm stock tractor operating at no more than 10% over manufacturer's RPM specifications is relased from the safety equipment requirement)

- Tractors must have steel engine side shields.

- Tractors must use an approved blanket on the transmission and clutch area.

– All engine fans must be shrouded with factory shroud or 1/16" thick steel shroud.

- All tractors must have a safety kill switch or an air shutoff.

- Each tractor must have a 2.5 lb. dry chemical fire extinguisher accessible to the driver while operating the tractor.

**16.** The exhaust MUST dishcarge vertically and MUST have two (2) Grade 5 cross bolts (3/8") in the exhaust elbow or pipe. Bolts must be installed 90 degrees to each other and within one (1) inch of each other as close to turbo as possible.

17. Driver must wear a motor sport designed helmet. (Snell 80 or higher).

**18.** Driver must be a minimum of 18 years of age to pull in this class. Or, if ages 16 or 17, must present a signed and notarized statement of permission from a parent or legal guardian.

19. All drivers must wear leather shoes and long pants.

20. No more than one perosn is permitted on the tractor at any time.

**21.** Driver must remain seated and have at least one hand on the wheel at all times. Driver may not leave the seat of the tractor while it is running.

## 6,000 lbs. OPEN TRACTOR (Antique Class) RULES
